**Abstract:** Eco-feminism regards the oppression of women and nature as interconnected and combines the philosophy of feminism with the principles of ecology and environmental ethics. It asserts that all forms of oppression are connected and that structures of oppression must be addressed in their totality. Oppression of the natural world and of women by patriarchal power structures must be examined together.

In the first section of the present paper, I will try to analyze the interconnections between the status of women and the status of non-human nature based on four central claims: the oppression of women and the oppression of nature are interconnected; these connections must be understood in order to understand both the oppression of women and the oppression of nature; feminist analysis must include ecological insights; and a radical perspective must be a part of any postcolonial ecological work. The second section of the paper aims to foreground the eco-feminist issues presented in the poem 'The Earth and the Woman' by Temsula Ao from Northeast India.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

Eco-feminism emerged in the 1970s and 1980s as hybrid forms of feminist and environmental theories and activities intersected. Women must see that their struggle for liberation for them and the solution to the ecological crisis within a society, whose fundamental model of relationships continues to be one of domination. This (also) unites the demands of the women's movement with those of the ecological movement in envision a radical reshaping of the basic socioeconomic relations and the underlying values of this [modern industrial] society (204).

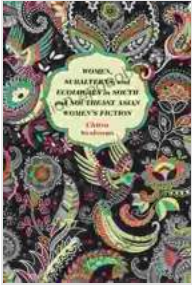
Ruetli's words bear a central issue of eco-feminist earth and the other subaltern experience the (crum) of patriarchy along with women. Classism, capitalism, heterosexism, racism (a term coined by Warren) and speciesism are all intertwined. In other words, eco-feminism is a movement that makes connections between environmentalists and feminists; more precisely, it articulates the theory that the ideologies that authorize injustices based on gender, race and class are related to the ideologies that sanction the exploitation and degradation of the environment (Shigooa 1997: 23). Eco-feminist seeks to recognize the interconnectedness and battle these injustices; as Greta Girard suggests: "More than a theory about feminism and environmentalism,

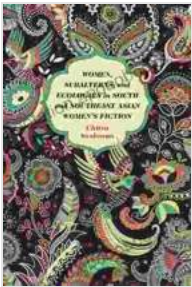
